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What is UNITED METHODIST WOMEN?



Did you know that United Methodist Women, as a group, dates back almost 150 years to our predecessor organizations? It's a fascinating history. During those years, the focus has been on ministry to women, children and youth and has included medical and educational outreach as well as spiritual.

Today, United Methodist Women is an international organization with groups in many United Methodist churches. Together, we are able to reach and help people nearby and far away. But it all begins with local units.

CUMC is in the process of renewing our UMW unit. Any and all women are welcome to participate; you do not need to be a member of CUMC. Two circles, or subgroups, have been formed. If you have joined one of these groups, you are considered a member of the local unit. Circles meet regularly, usually monthly, and each has its own leadership, projects, and programs. The unit typically meets once or twice a year, usually for an event (luncheon, special program, etc.) to which all members and guests are invited. A leadership team exists to facilitate planning for such events, and input is solicited from circles.

All women are welcome to join the circles. You may join a circle based upon the meeting time that best fits your needs, or you may "try out" both circles or even attend both. Additionally, you may join UMW even if you are unable to attend either circle (contact Jeanne Long 763-9956).

Lydia Circle meets the first Tuesday of each month, in the Werner Lounge at 2:00pm. Co-leaders are Linda Schumacher (245-0898) and Bobbi Ostermeyer (607-2841), and treasurer is Sue Duebber.

Sarah Circle meets the fourth Tuesday of each month at 7:00pm, also in the Werner Lounge. Vicki Groh (661-5852) is circle leader.

The leadership team at this point consists of Jeanne Long, president (763-9956) and Vicki Groh, treasurer. Additional members are needed for this team.

There are no dues or membership fees that members are required to pay. However, offerings may be taken to support missions and programs of the circles, and

members are requested to make a yearly pledge to mission that will go to support the missions and programs of the National Organization of United Methodist Women.

The stated purpose of UMW is:

United Methodist Women shall be a community of women whose purpose is to know God and to experience freedom as whole persons through Jesus Christ, to develop a creative, supportive fellowship, and to expand concepts of mission through participation in the global ministries of the church.
