A Church Alive

I am excited about Cheviot United Methodist Church. I hope that you are, too. Because when I think of all that has happened over these past 6 months (even in the midst of a pandemic), I am overjoyed. Whether it is our outreach in the community, our food drives, community prayer walks, Bible studies, welcoming new members, or the many stories of life change that we have been part of, the only word that describes Cheviot United Methodist Church is the word, "Alive". As we move into 2021, I firmly believe that the Spirit is with us and that the future is unlimited.

Earlier this month, I came across a helpful article that outlined the 6 practices of a healthy and vibrant church; A church that I would call "Alive". I was encouraged to see many of practices already happening at Cheviot United Methodist Church. See if you recognize our church in any of these practices.

Here are 6 things that "Alive" Churches do:

- 1.) **They listen to the right things.** They listen to the Word of God in Scriptures. They listen to the needs of their neighbors in their communities. They listen to each other in their planning and their visioning.
- 2.) **They pay attention to the right numbers.** Rather than focusing on bodies, buildings, and budgets, they focus on the numbers of people that they have reached for Christ, the number of people whose lives have been transformed, and the number of people who are growing in their relationship with Jesus. They know that when they focus on those numbers, the numbers that represent bodies, buildings, and budgets will take care of themselves.
- 3.) **They work to accomplish God's mission rather than working only for self-preservation.** God's goal is to heal the world, to grow his kingdom and to restore what was lost. An "Alive" church keeps God's mission front and center. When they do, they don't have to worry about self-preservation.

4.) **They have a vibrant ministry of the laity.** "Alive" churches know that each person's work is the way that God chooses to heal the world. They help every member of their church discover their spiritual gifts and their unique calling to serve God in the church and in the world.

5.) **They make "Shalom" a priority.** "Alive" churches are working to maintain peace in every relationship. They seek peace between God, others, and themselves. They work to resolve conflict quickly and completely. They strive for unity of the Spirit amidst the diversity of their church.

6.) **They prioritize spiritual formation.** "Alive" Churches give their members tools to deepen their relationship with Christ. They help their members grow in an intimate, personal relationship with Jesus.

As you read this, we are in the midst of planning for our 2021 Stewardship campaign. Our strategy is to Grow High, Grow Wide, and Grow Deep. With all that we have accomplished in 2020, there is even more to be excited about in 2021. We have come a long way, but there is more work ahead. Be watching your mailbox, your all-church email, our website, Facebook and social media for ways that, with your financial support and service, we will impact our community, expand our reach with children, youth, young adults and their families, and grow deeper in our relationship with Jesus-- the One who makes it all possible.

I had been thinking a lot about the verse in Hebrews 11:1 that says in the King James Version that "Faith is the Substance of things hoped for". That word "substance" caught my attention big time. One morning as I made John his toast for breakfast I had run out of the "good" bread. I bought a loaf of lesser quality bread and took it up that morning. As we ate, I mentioned the fact to John that the bread he was eating that day was not the "good" bread. It had lesser substance than the "good" bread. It did not have a lot of nutrition in it. The bread I usually buy is 100% Whole Wheat with natural ingredients and even bits of wheat grain in it. It is rich in nutrients and fiber. So, then we talked about the "substance" of the breads and I shared with him that I had been thinking about our faith and substance.



We then began to try to define the word "substance". John said that it can mean the ingredients. I mentioned that it is the glue that holds something together. As I looked further for the definition of the word, I found some interesting definitions. Here are a few:

- * the quality of being important, valid, significance
- * solidity, firmness, something not imaginary
- * an immaterial yet real and solid

In faith, substance is that which stands under, the foundation of what we believe. It is the glue that holds us together spiritually. What are some of the things that determine how big or how small our faith is? How **BIG** is our God? Human reasoning can get in the way of our faith. When we rely a lot on human reasoning our faith is not solid. Yes, human reasoning has its place but not in matters of faith. Human reasoning does not have the capacity to tell us that Jesus was born of a virgin, but faith knows He was. Human reasoning cannot prove that Jesus, God the Son, became a man and died on the cross for our sins. But faith can. Human reasoning cannot tell us that in three days Jesus rose from the dead. But faith can. The question here is, what kind of substance does our faith have in our lives? Our faith is small when we rely on human reasoning for our understanding of God. As believers, we enter a world that rises above human reasoning. Another thing that makes our God small is when we depend on ourselves to make it in life. When our God is small, everything depends on us. We are governed by our circumstances and feelings and emotions. Faith in a Big God rises above what is

happening to us to God's greater plan that has an Eternal perspective. This is not easy and in this area we all need to grow in our faith. In the New Testament there are a lot of verses about faith. Matthew 7:20 says that even a grain of mustard seed of faith can be strong. Romans 1:17 says that the just shall live by faith. II Corinthians 5:7 says that we walk by faith and not by sight. Hebrews 10:23 says that we are to hold fast to our faith, not wavering.

Jesus asked the question, "Will there be any faith when I return?"

The substance of our faith must become stronger and stronger in the days in which we live.

Without a strong faith we will really struggle. I know because I too struggle as you do. Now let's look at what ingredients we need as the substance of a strong faith by which to live in these days.

What are the ingredients in this substance?

* A.W. Tozer in his book, "Faith beyond Reason" says that as Christians we need to put our faith in the "Character of God". When I take the time to look at God's world and marvel at His handiwork, my faith grows stronger. What a mighty God we serve! We need to meditate on God's attributes, His character. God is faithful, holy, just, unchanging, merciful, loving and the list goes on and on. Meditate on God and Who He is.


* Worship God. If our God is too small, we cannot truly worship Him. We need to open our hearts and let His Spirit lead us in true worship.

* Read God's Word, Romans tells us that faith comes by hearing (and reading) the Word of God.

* Sing and listen to the songs/hymns of faith. As I sing the hymns of faith and John listens, I am drawn into God's truth in the words. I have found an old hymn "My Faith has Found a Resting Place" and oh, how it speaks to me.

"My faith has found a resting place, not in device or creed. It is enough that Jesus died and that He died for me. I need no other argument; I need no other plea. It is enough that Jesus died and that He died for me"! The substance of our faith as it grows stronger and stronger in the Lord becomes the "anchor of our soul". We will then be able to stand strong in these days in which we live.

I need to grow in my faith, *do you?*

Festival Of Sharing Update

We had a very successful kit drive in August, completing 96 school kits and 57 health kits. Unfortunately, before our depot pickup date, the Church World Service Festival Of Sharing Committee halted collections due to the corona virus. Our kits are in storage until a new date is set, possibly in the Spring.

Rather than create more kits for storage, the Missions Committee voted to use \$150 in additional Festival Of Sharing donations to participate in the **Church World Service 3-for-1 Cleanup Bucket Challenge**.

For a limited time, each \$75 donation fills three 5-gallon

emergency buckets with supplies instead of just one.

In addition to cleaning supplies, buckets contain insect repellent, clothespins & clothesline, dust masks, trash bags, and gloves.

Church World Service shipped 2,000 buckets to areas impacted by hurricanes in August.

Sandwiches for Our Daily Bread

Many thanks to all who have embraced our new mission project for Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen & Social Center.

We have gone from twelve volunteer Sandwich Warriors in June, to twenty-two in August, and have made over 1,000 sandwiches in three months!!!

So many have expressed how rewarding, and how much fun it has been to make sandwiches for our friends at Our Daily Bread Soup Kitchen & Social Center.

Our next date will be Thursday, October 22 for those either making sandwiches at church, or dropping off already made sandwiches.

Each volunteer is asked to make either 20 PB&J sandwiches (white bread/smooth PB), or 20 turkey/ turkey bologna/ or beef bologna sandwiches, with American or Cheddar cheese; although some choose to make more.

Westfed Food Pantry Update

This October 24th, Cheviot United Methodist Church will have the opportunity to help support the Westfed Food Pantry, collecting items for holiday distribution.

We particularly need canned hams (12 oz. or 16 oz.) and muffin mixes (any boxed mix or pouch - corn muffins, blueberry muffins, etc.) to be used as part of the pantry's Thanksgiving meal distribution. Non-perishable items requested are cereal, peanut butter, jelly (plastic jars please), canned fruits, vegetables and meat, toilet paper, paper towels, and cleaning products. Pork and beans, toothpaste, spaghetti and spaghetti sauce (plastic cans or jars preferred) are always needed. An added bonus would be having the items placed into paper bags. The food pantry uses paper bags to distribute to families.



Look for separate information regarding this year's Operation Christmas Child program as we will also be collecting shoeboxes during the October Food drive.

A few months ago, as you may remember, before Coved 19 (seems like longer than that), Lynn Krebs decided to retire. Lynn has been our custodian and our building manager for over 28 years. We talked to Lynn and she agreed to stay with us a little longer. Lynn is a person that always has put the best interest of our church first. She has been a great person to work with and our church was always clean.

We have had applications for the custodian's position for some time and we decided it was time to interview people for the job. We interviewed three people for the position and all three were very nice people. The interview team was Pastor Carrie, Lynn Krebs and Charles Sparenberg. After some discussion, we chose to hire Lindsey Zech Bethel.

Lindsey's family has a long history with Cheviot United Methodist Church. If you are a long-time member you might remember the name Zech. They were members of our Scout Troop 201 in the 50's. I am sure Dick Becker will remember that name. I believe one of them was Lindsey's grandfather. Now I want to take you back to the 60's and 70's. We had a family named Hicks that were members of our church. Their mother's name is Sandy Hicks, now Sandy Heady. They had twin daughters named Terry and Jerry. I believe Terry and Jerry were seniors at West Hi or just out of high school when Jerry came down with cancer. I remember they went to another city and did a bone marrow transplant. The doctors thought it might work because Terry and Jerry were twins. But I am sorry to say it did not work and Jerry passed away. It was a very hard time for our church. Cathy Cummings Davis was good friends with the twins and remembers it well. Terry is Lindsey's mother.

Lindsey has been a preschool teacher at our CUMC Preschool for the last few years. She was looking for additional work and does not live too far away from our church. She is a college graduate, with a degree in Nutrition Science from the University of Cincinnati. She is very personable, motivated and disciplined person. Over the next few weeks, she will be working with Lynn and then Lynn will phase out and Lindsey will take over.
